This Checklist Will Help You Prepare Your Garden for Next Spring:

Know Your Gardening Zone. - Research should be the first task on your list. ...

Purchase and Start Seeds. ...

1. Understanding Your Gardening Zone

- Research should be your initial step. Gardening expert Molly E. Williams advises, "Before you start working in your garden, ensure it's the right time based on your agricultural zone." Different zones correspond to geographical locations, guiding not only when to plant but also what to plant as certain crops thrive in specific zones.
- 2. Buying and Starting Seeds
 - Procuring seeds before spring allows for ample planning time, crucial for successful planting. Williams notes, "Each seed has unique germination requirements. Some need to start indoors, while others can be directly sown. Create a calendar highlighting planting and starting times."
- 3. Cleaning Garden Beds
 - Clear out fallen leaves, debris, and weeds from garden beds during fall and winter to prepare for spring. Adrienne Roethling, garden director for Paul J. Ciener Botanical Garden, emphasizes the importance of removing weeds before they seed to prevent future issues. Additionally, remove dead material from plants like hydrangeas and ornamental grasses to ensure they thrive.
- 4. Soil Preparation

Preparing your soil for spring is essential. If your soil has compacted during the winter, till it until workable. Conduct a soil test to check the pH level for suitability Based on the results, apply fertilizers and soil amendments in spring. For instance, adjust acidic soil by adding compost mix or other materials to correct

pH levels.




Tips for Preparing Your Garden Before Spring:

- Lay down mulch in late winter to avoid stepping on emerging plants and prevent weed growth. Ground mulch is recommended for its nutrient benefits.
- Prune plants before spring to manage size, encourage flowering, and remove diseased branches. Prune summer flowering shrubs during the dormant season.

Check gardening tools at the end of winter to ensure you have all essentials, clean tools monthly to prevent disease spread, and invest in sharpening tools like stones and lubricating oil.
